

What is the Role of Race in Religions Today?

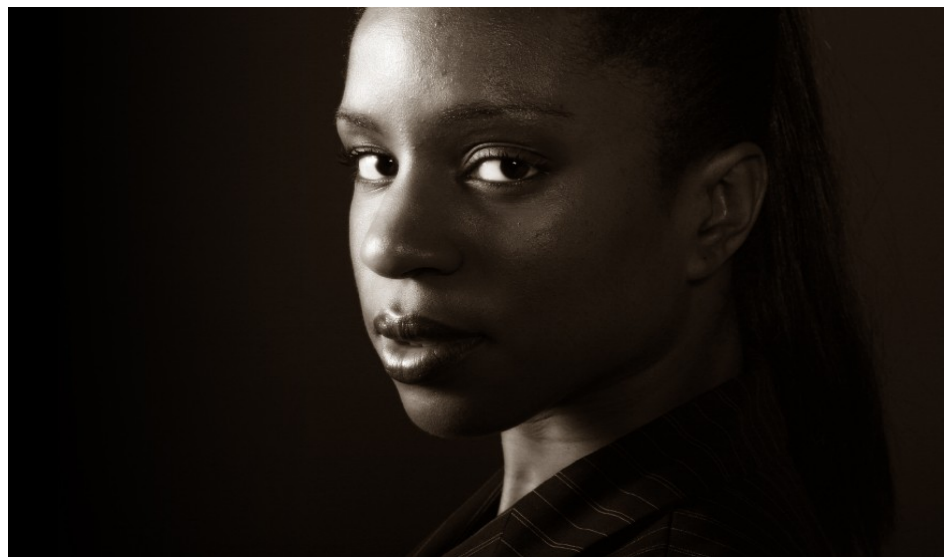
A panel discussion cosponsored by Interfaith Council of Greater Richmond, First Freedom Center and Virginia Commonwealth University Religious Studies Program
